2008: January to December



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## About the Boulder County Domestic Abuse Prevention Project

Since 1986, the Domestic Abuse Prevention Project (DAPP) worked to improve the response to intimate partner violence (or domestic violence) in Boulder County. By treating domestic violence as a crime, we strove to raise awareness of the issues to prevent further abuse. The Project was a coordinated effort among law enforcement, the District Attorney's Office, the Judiciary, Community Justice Services, Probation, Private Probation Services, Social Services, battered women's shelters, perpetrator treatment providers and concerned individuals. DAPP acted as a liaison to all involved agencies, monitored the effectiveness of system-wide efforts, and maintained statistics on all reported cases of domestic violence in Boulder County.

As Boulder County continues to address Domestic Violence in our community, we are moving forward to the new vision of the next chapter in the coordinated response to Domestic Violence. In 2009 DAPP Advisory Board has been working to restructure the response to family violence and is looking at the functions of the new organization we would like to put in place. As we are shaping this reorganization, we will keep the community posted on the new response to Domestic Violence in Boulder County.

#### **DAPP** Advisory Board

DAPP's Advisory Board, appointed by the Board of County Commissioners, consisted of members from within the criminal justice system as well as agencies and individuals from the community. ### Statistical Summary

#### • All Boulder County Case Summary:

- In 2008, Boulder County law enforcement reported a **4% increase** in cases (formal and informal) from the previous year. Arrest rates are up **6%** throughout the county.
- Longmont is reporting 40% of the formal domestic violence cases for Boulder County.
- This year's double arrest numbers are up by 41% from last year (a total of 97 cases in 2008 compared to 69 cases in 2007). 8% of total charged cases were double arrests.
- Informal case numbers are up 5%. DAPP staff has worked closely with staff from law enforcement records departments throughout the county to gather information on informal cases. We thank all the officers, detectives, and records departments' staffs who that helped us obtain these non-charged reports.

#### 3 Year Trend by Agency, including Formal and Informal Reports:

• This report contains a three-year comparison of domestic violence numbers for individual law enforcement agencies in Boulder County. It also includes information on the number of formal reports (full custody arrests, warrant arrests, summons, and book and release) and informal (open reports, incident reports, and outstanding warrants). This should be useful in localizing increases and decreases of domestic violence incidents throughout the county.

#### Felonies and Misdemeanors:

• The ratio of felonies and misdemeanors has fluctuated by six percent in the last two years. In 2008, **22%** of the cases were felonies (down from 23% in 2007) and **78%** of the cases were misdemeanors (down from 77% in 2007).

#### County Demographics:

- The rate of female arrests has increased from **24%** in 2007 to **25%** in 2008. In 2006, the rate was **20%**.
- The majority of defendants and victims, about 44%, are in the age range of 18-29 years old.
- DAPP rarely receives juvenile (offenders under the age of 18) domestic violence cases because state statute does not require that these cases be labeled as domestic violence. However, based on the cases DAPP did receive, the >18 demographic has varied over the last three years. In 2008, 2% of cases were from this demographic, vs. 3% for 2007 and 2% for 2006.

#### • Incident Information:

- In more than one third of all cases, the defendant and victim are no longer involved in a relationship.
- In 37 % of the cases, defendants used alcohol and/or an illegal substance; in 18 % of the cases, victims used alcohol and/or an illegal substance. A slightly smaller portion of the cases (15%) indicated that both the defendant and victim used alcohol and/or an illegal substance.
- In 73% of the cases, law enforcement reports indicated that victim advocate services (by either calling, presenting a brochure, etc.) were offered at the time of the incident.
- In 11% of the cases, the defendant used a weapon. DAPP defines a weapon as something other than a part of the body used to threaten or harm the victim. In the majority of those cases, defendants used something other than a knife or firearm (telephones, bottles, keys, rocks, baseball bats, etc.). The exception is when "hands" are used for strangulation.
- For the last several years, Boulder County law enforcement agencies have been charging felony crimes in strangulation cases (hands can be used as a deadly weapon). Assuming this trend continues, DAPP may change its definition to include hands as a weapon in our statistical reports. In 2008, 7% of the cases involved hands used as a deadly weapon. See page 9, table 30, for more information on strangulation.

#### Children Who Witness:

- Documentation of children witnessing domestic violence has increased over the years. In 2008, 20% (243) of all charged cases included children witnessing the incident. The defendant was charged with child abuse in 68% (165) of these cases.
- The actual arrest on child abuse charges allows the system to step in and complete a more intensive assessment of the status of the children and offer appropriate services as needed. An increased number of dispositions mandate the defendant to attend parenting classes.
- In 2008, a total number of **566** children were documented as witnesses to violence in the home; this is an increase as compared to **504** children who witnessed a domestic violence case in 2007.

#### Bonds:

- In 2008, **74** % of defendants did, and **26**% of defendants did not, post bond prior to disposition.
- In 2004, the 20<sup>th</sup> Judicial District made the decision that all defendants arrested for a domestic violence-related charge be held until they are seen by a judge or magistrate in open court. This brings our judicial district into compliance with state statute §18-1-1001(5), which mandates that all domestic violence offenders are advised by a judge of the Criminal Protection Order (CPO) placed on them for the duration of their case. No domestic violence arrestee will be eligible for release prior to seeing a judge. Given these changes, DAPP no longer reports information on defendants held for a bond hearing.

#### Recidivism and Multiple Victimizations

- DAPP's definition of recidivism and repeat victimizations includes <u>only domestic violence</u> <u>crimes committed in Boulder County</u>. Please note that DAPP's conversion to the new database allows for tracking recidivism and repeat victimization starting in 1994, when we developed our first electronic database.
- For the past three years, recidivism rates have increased from 30% in 2006, 34% in 2007 to 35% in 2008. Additionally, multiple victimization (individuals who have been victimized 2 or more times) rates have increased from 28% in 2006, 31% in 2007 to 33% in 2008.

#### Disposition Information:

- In 2008, **68%** (**586**) of convicted offenders were ordered to complete state mandated domestic violence treatment. **46%** (**399**) of convicted offenders were ordered to jail or prison.
- 453 of all offenders were documented as using alcohol or drugs at the time of the incident. Of these, 268 (59%) were sentenced to either alcohol or substance abuse treatment as an additional component of their sentence.
- For all Domestic Violence cases sentenced in 2008, 75% of those defendants were convicted of at least one charge and 25% were dismissed.
- From all Domestic Violence cases that were sentenced in 2008, 25% were females and 75% were males. Of the cases where females were sentenced, 33% were dismissed, however of the cases where males were sentenced only 16% were dismissed.

#### Overview of Domestic Violence in Boulder County:

- This year we added a new graph to compare the population variation through the years with the trend on Domestic Violence cases in Boulder County.
- The overview includes Broomfield domestic violence cases until the incorporation of Broomfield County (2001). Although it appears that annual numbers are down starting in 2002, page 24 does not account for the loss of Broomfield cases. Annual numbers of reported cases continue on a slightly upward trend when the Broomfield cases are removed from the data.

#### Domestic Violence Incidents: Three Year Trend (2006-2008)

Nederland, Erie and Ward Police Departments were not included in the following tables because of the low number of domestic violence cases reported by these agencies yearly.

Nederland Police responded to: 10 formal domestic violence cases (8 full custody arrests and 2 warrants) and 1 domestic violence incident report for 2006; 8 formal domestic violence cases (7 full custody arrests and 1 warrant) for 2007; and 12 formal domestic violence cases (11 full custody arrests and 1 warrant) for 2008.

Erie Police (Boulder County portion of the city only) responded to: 13 formal domestic violence cases (12 full custody arrests and 1 warrant) and 1 domestic violence incident report for 2006; 14 formal domestic violence cases (13 full custody arrests and 1 warrant) for 2007; and 13 formal domestic violence cases (13 full custody arrests) for 2008.

Ward Police responded to 0 domestic violence case in 2006 and 2007; In 2008 had 1 formal domestic violence case (full custody arrest).



## **Bond Information\***

In 2006, there were 1132 defendants eligible for bond (full custody arrests and warrant arrest). Of those, 819 (72%) defendants posted bond and 313 (28%) defendants did not post bond. In 2007, there were 1180 defendants eligible for bond (full custody arrests and warrant arrest). Of those, 929 (79%) defendants posted bond and 251 (21%) defendants did not post bond. In 2008, there were 1227 defendants eligible for bond (full custody arrests and warrant arrest). Of those, 911 (74%) defendants posted bond and 315 (26%) defendants did not post bond.

In 2006, 819 defendants posted bond; from those 608 (74%) were first time offenders and 211 (26%) were recidivists. In 2007, 929 defendants posted bond; from those 651 (70%) were first time offenders and 278 (30%) were recidivists. In 2008, 911 defendants posted bond; from those 649 (71%) were first time offenders and 262 (29%) were recidivists.

## Information about First Time Offenders and Recidivists in Domestic Violence Offenses in Boulder County

#### First Time Offenders Versus Recidivists

For 2006, of the 1135 formal arrests, 784 (70%) were first time offenders and 351 (30%) were recidivists or had committed a previous domestic violence crime in Boulder County. Of the 2006 recidivists, 176 (50%) of the defendants committed their second domestic violence offense and 175 (50%) of defendants committed their third or more domestic violence offense.

For 2007, of the 1183 formal arrests, 775 (66%) were first time offenders and 408 (34%) were recidivists or had committed a previous domestic violence crime in Boulder County. Of the 2007 recidivists, 219 (54%) of the defendants committed their second domestic violence offense and 189 (46%) of defendants committed their third or more domestic violence offense.

For 2008, of the 1229 formal arrests, 795 (65%) were first time offenders and 434 (35%) were recidivists or had committed a previous domestic violence crime in Boulder County. Of the 2008 recidivists, 221 (51%) of the defendants committed their second domestic violence offense and 213 (49%) of defendants committed their third or more domestic violence offense.

For 2006, of the prior victims, 164 (51%) of the victims were victims of a second domestic violence offense and 156 (49%) of victims were victims of a third or more domestic violence offense.

For 2007, of the 1183 formal arrests, 821 (69%) were first time victims and 362 (31%) were prior victims of a domestic violence crime in Boulder County. For 2007, of the prior victims, 218 (60%) of the victims were victims of a second domestic violence offense and 144 (40%) of victims were victims of a third or more domestic violence offense.

For 2008, of the 1229 formal arrests, 822 (67%) were first time victims and 407 (33%) were prior victims of a domestic violence crime in Boulder County. For 2008, of the prior victims, 218 (54%) of the victims were victims of a second domestic violence offense and 189 (46%) of victims were victims of a third or more domestic violence offense.



## ~Dismissals by level of crime in 2008 ~






#### ~Dismissals by Gender in 2008 ~










## Disposition Information ~ Court Ordered Treatment

#### 36 Week Domestic Violence Treatment Ordered

In 2006, **541** (**63%** of total convictions) offenders were sentenced to dv treatment; of these, **357** (**41%**) were sentenced to jail. **72%** were first time offenders and **28%** were recidivists.

In 2007, **534** (**61%** of total convictions) offenders were sentenced to dv treatment; of these, **399** (**46%**) were sentenced to jail. **75%** were first time offenders and **25%** were recidivists.

In 2008, **586** (**68%** of total convictions) offenders were sentenced to dv treatment; of these, **391** (**45%**) were sentenced to jail. **76%** were first time offenders and **24%** were recidivists.



#### Mental Health, Anger Management, and Alcohol/Substance Abuse Treatment Ordered\*

In 2006, **85** offenders were sentenced to mental health tx. For 2007, **96** offenders were sentenced to mental health tx. For 2008, **92** offenders were sentenced to mental health tx.

In 2006, **28** offenders were sentenced to anger management tx. For 2007, **36** offenders were sentenced to anger management tx. For 2008, **10** offenders were sentenced to anger management tx.

For 2006, in **466** cases with dispositions the defendant used alcohol or an illegal substance. Of those cases, **247** (**53%**) offenders were sentenced to alcohol and/or substance abuse treatment.



For 2007, in 455 cases with dispositions the defendant used alcohol or an illegal substance. Of those cases, 255 (56%) offenders were sentenced to alcohol and/or substance abuse treatment.

For 2008, in **453** cases with dispositions the defendant used alcohol or an illegal substance. Of those cases, **268** (**59%**) offenders were sentenced to alcohol and/or substance abuse treatment.

### Disposition Information ~ Charging and Disposition Information Regarding Children

In 2006, **350** (**30%**) of cases with dispositions involved children. Of those, **174** (**50%**) of the defendants were charged with child abuse and **21** (**12%** of defendants charged) defendants were convicted of a child abuse charge.

In 2007, **324 (28%)** of cases with dispositions involved children. Of those, **175 (54%)** of the defendants were charged with child abuse and **15 (9% of defendants charged)** defendants were convicted of a child abuse charge.

In 2008, 291 (25%) of cases with dispositions involved children. Of those, 155 (54%) of the defendants were charged with child abuse and 10 (6% of defendants charged) defendants were convicted of a child abuse charge.

In 2006, **68 (8% of total convictions)** defendants were sentenced to cooperate with the Department of Social Services and **11 (1% of total convictions)** defendants were sentenced to parenting classes as a condition of their disposition.

In 2007, **48** (**5%** of total convictions) defendants were sentenced to cooperate with the Department of Social Services and **18** (**2%** of total convictions) defendants were sentenced to parenting classes as a condition of their disposition.

In 2008, **45** (**5%** of total convictions) defendants were sentenced to cooperate with the Department of Social Services and **18** (**2%** of total convictions) defendants were sentenced to parenting classes as a condition of their disposition.






### Domestic Violence Comparison by Population In Boulder County\* January - December 2008










