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# LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

March 2013

Dear Friends:

This month a grid-locked Congress allowed the "Sequester" to go into effect, launching cuts that damage the cause of justice and opportunity for people living in poverty. This is but the most recent example of the failure of Congress to address poverty. Unfortunately 2012 was filled with many more examples, as our 2012 Poverty Scorecard reveals.

The Shriver Center's 2012 Poverty Scorecard is a comprehensive analysis of the 2012 voting record of every U.S. Senator and Representative on poverty issues. By examining poverty-related votes across a wide range of subject matters, the 2012 Poverty Scorecard demonstrates why each of these subject matters should be understood as important to the fight against poverty. The 2012 Poverty Scorecard thus provides a fair measure of our elected representatives' commitments to achieving justice and opportunity for people living in poverty. It is designed to serve as a tool to hold our elected officials accountable for ensuring that all Americans have access to justice and opportunity.

Since we began publishing the Poverty Scorecard in 2007, poverty has increased by 9 million people from 37 million to 46 million, now involving a staggering 1 in 7 of all Americans. For certain major subgroups, the poverty rate is much higher—22 percent of children, 27 percent of Blacks, 27 percent of Hispanics and 31 percent of families headed by a single mother. During this time, Congress has become increasingly divided in the way it votes on poverty issues, resulting in the passage of very little helpful legislation for people living in poverty. The year 2012 exemplified the continued unwillingness of Congress to put the needs of struggling Americans ahead of partisan politics.

Occasionally, though, we do see examples of how Congress can advance justice and opportunity when they act together. The recent reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA), which significantly strengthens the ability of the federal government, the states, law enforcement, and service providers to combat domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking, is an excellent example of the power of laws and policies to improve justice and opportunity for a large segment of people in poverty. We hope you will spend some time reviewing our 2012 Poverty Scorecard to see how your elected representatives voted and that you will join the Shriver Center in letting them know that you want them to do more to advance laws and policies that secure justice and opportunity for all, especially those most in need.

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

For the second consecutive year, Congress has done virtually nothing to advance justice or opportunity for the 46 million people—15 percent of all Americans—who are living in poverty in the United States. The most significant povertyrelated legislation that Congress voted on in 2012 spanned a range of subject matters, including budget and tax, food and nutrition, health care, immigrants, cash assistance, community and economic development, domestic violence, energy conservation, gender discrimination, housing, legal services, unemployment compensation, veterans and workforce. Yet, the only two pieces of legislation of benefit to people living in poverty that Congress passed in 2012 were compromise measures that had to be resolved to avert fiscal disaster. These bills were:

- H.R. 3630, the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation act, which extended tax cuts and unemployment benefits for one year.
- H.R. 8, the American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012, the 'fiscal cliff' legislation which averted scheduled income tax rate increases and postponed the spending reductions required by the sequestration process. It also made certain tax cuts permanent, extended the improvements to the low-income tax credits for five years, and extended unemployment insurance benefits.

Both of these pieces of legislation were signed into law by President Obama in 2012.

### The House of Representatives

With the exception of the two bills described above, almost every other significant povertyrelated legislative proposal that the House of Representatives voted on in 2012 would have worsened poverty or reduced access to justice if it had been enacted. The House of Representatives voted on whether or not to eliminate and/ or reduce funding for several programs that are critical to people living in poverty:

- In the health care area, there were votes on the repeal of two key provisions of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), the Prevention and Public Health Fund and the Community Living Assistance Services and Supports Program, as well as a vote to repeal the ACA in its entirety.
- · There were votes on the elimination of all economic development assistance programs for low-income people and the Community Development Block Grant program that provides capital funding for public works projects in low-income communities.
- · Proposed funding cuts for legal services and subsidized housing were also up for vote, as

were proposals to prevent the U.S. Government from enforcing laws that protect the civil rights of immigrants.

### The Senate

In the Senate, many of the votes on povertyrelated legislation were defensive measures to preserve existing protections rather than votes for initiatives designed to make conditions better for people living in poverty.

In two separate votes, a minority of Senators employed legislative tactics to prevent votes for initiatives targeted to help many low-income Americans, including:

- · Veterans job corps and employment programs
- Women's right to equal pay for equal work

A proposed amendment to the Farm Bill to convert the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) into state block grants, which would have prevented the program from responding to increased hunger during a recession, was tabled.

## The Ryan Budget

Both the House of Representatives and the Senate voted once again on Representative Paul Ryan's budget proposal, which would have significantly reduced funding for a plethora of anti-poverty programs including:

- · Pell Grants for higher education
- Employment and training programs
- The WIC nutrition program for pregnant women and young children
- Mental health and substance abuse programs

The proposed Ryan budget would have also dismantled the Medicare program and undermined the structure and effectiveness of Medicaid and SNAP, both important safety net programs for millions of Americans. The budget proposal, in the form of a concurrent resolution, passed the House but was rejected by the Senate.

## Congress

On balance, the Senate generally prevented the House of Representatives from doing too much harm to programs affecting people living in poverty in 2012, but very little was accomplished to reduce poverty or advance justice. Partisan politics played a key role in the lack of progress on legislation which would advance justice and opportunity for people living in poverty, with Republicans and Democrats remaining deeply divided on the issues and few moderates in Congress.

# **KEY FINDINGS**

- In 2012, Congress did virtually nothing to advance justice or opportunity for the 46 million people living in poverty in the U.S.
- · While the significant poverty-related legislation voted on by Congress in 2012 spanned a wide range of subject areas, Congress passed only two pieces of significant povertyrelated legislation, both of which were compromise measures related to extending tax cuts and credits and averting fiscal disaster.
- There were very few moderates in Congress in 2012. 95% of the Senators and 92% of the Representatives were at one extreme or the other, receiving a grade of A+ or A or D, F or F-. Only 5 Senators and 32 Representatives received a B or C grade.
- States with a lower poverty rate were more likely to have a Congressional delegation with a good recording in voting to fight poverty. 9 of the 10 states with A or A+ records had poverty rates below the national average of 15%.
- States with a higher poverty rate were more likely to have a Congressional delegation with a poor record in voting to fight poverty. 14 of the 20 states with D, F or F- records had poverty rates that were higher than the national average of 15%.
- There is at most only a very weak correlation between the poverty rate in a Congressional District and the voting record of the Member of the House of Representatives who represents that district.

# **METHODOLOGY**

In consultation with national anti-poverty experts in twenty different fields, we selected the most significant votes on poverty issues in the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives in calendar year 2012. The votes we selected cover a wide range of subject areas, including budget and tax, food and nutrition, health care, immigrants, cash assistance, community and economic development, domestic violence, energy conservation, gender discrimination, housing, legal services, unemployment compensation, veterans and workforce.

Each member of the House is scored based on 17 selected votes and each member of the Senate is scored based on 11 selected votes. If a member did not cast a "yes" or "no" vote on a particular measure (for example, if the member was absent), that vote was not considered in determining the member's score. Each vote is given equal weight. We did not score members

who did not vote enough times for the score to be a fair assessment of their performance.

We ranked 424 of 435 members of the House of Representatives, each of whom voted on at least 12 of the 17 votes we selected. We ranked 99 of 100 senators, each of whom voted on at least 10 of the 11 votes we selected.

Where multiple votes were taken on the same legislation, we used the vote that was the most significant in the disposition of the legislation, e.g., final passage, adoption of an amendment, a motion to invoke cloture, another procedural motion, etc.

We used the same grading scale to assign a grade to each state delegation based on the average score of the state's Senators and Representatives.

## SENATE VOTE SUMMARIES

1. S.22. Agreeing to the Conference Report to Accompany H.R. 3630, the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act. This vote extended, for one year, the 2 percent payroll tax cut and up to 99 weeks of unemployment insurance benefits. This legislation passed the Senate by a vote of 60-36, passed the House by a vote of 293-132, and was signed into law by President Obama on February 22, 2012.

2. S. 31. S. Amdt. 1738 to S. 1813. This amendment to the bill reauthorizing Federal aid for highways would have reduced Federal funding for workforce and other programs important to low-income people by over \$10 billion. This amendment was rejected in the Senate by a vote of 52-46.

3. S. 87. Passage of S.1925, reauthorizing the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). VAWA seeks to end violence against women and improve services, protection, housing and economic security for victims of domestic violence. This bill passed the Senate by a vote of 68-31. The House subsequently passed its own version of this law, H.R. 258, which omitted certain key provisions of the Senate bill. Thus, VAWA has not been reauthorized.

4. S. 98. Motion to Proceed to Consider House Concurrent Resolution 112. Popularly known as the Ryan budget, this concurrent resolution set forth the budget of the United States Government for FY 2013 and established budgetary levels for fiscal years 2014 through 2022. The Ryan budget proposed to make devastating cuts to programs that primarily serve low-income Americans, including Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly Food Stamps), Pell Grants, housing, education, training and social services programs. The proposed budget also would have dismantled the Medicare program. And, it would have repealed the Affordable Care Act (Obamacare), leaving 34 million individuals without health insurance coverage. This concurrent resolution passed the House by a vote of 228-191 but was rejected by the Senate by a vote of 58-41.

5. S. 112. S. Amdt. 2153 to S. 2343. This amendment sought to repeal Section 4002 of the Affordable Care Act (Obamacare), thereby eliminating funding for the Prevention and Public Health Fund. This fund provides expanded support for the prevention of diabetes, breast cancer and obesity, as well as immunization programs, preventive care and health screenings for infants, children and adolescents. This legislation passed the House by a vote of 215-195 but was rejected by the Senate by a vote of 62-34.

6. S. 115. Motion to Invoke Cloture on the Motion to Proceed to Consider S. 3220, the Paycheck Fairness Act. This bill would have required employers to demonstrate that any salary differences between men and women

doing the same work are not gender-related. This measure also prohibited employers from discriminating or retaliating against employees who share salary information with co-workers. This would have helped to eliminate pay disparities, strengthened the Equal Pay Act, and provided women with more tools to fight discrimination in the workplace. This motion was rejected by the Senate by a vote of 52-47 (3/5 majority required).

7. S. 120. Motion to Table S. Amdt. 2392 to S. 3240. This amendment to the Farm Bill would have fundamentally altered the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly Food Stamps). It would have converted the program from a 100 percent federally funded entitlement into a state block grant. Under a block grant, each state would receive a fixed sum of money, preventing the program from responding to increased hunger during a recession. The Senate motion to table this amendment was agreed to by a vote of 65-33.

8. S. 127. S. Amdt. 2174 to S. 3240. This amendment to the Farm Bill sought to limit categorical eligibility for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly Food Stamps) to persons who receive cash assistance, requiring all others to satisfy an asset test. Asset tests force households to spend all of their available resources and become impoverished before they can quality

for SNAP benefits. This amendment would have caused millions of low-income individuals to be cut off SNAP benefits. This amendment was rejected in the Senate by a vote of 56-43.

9. S. 184. Passage of S. 3412. This bill would have extended, for one year, the Bush tax cuts for individuals making less than \$200,000 and married couples making less than \$250,000. It also would have extended the improvements to the low-income child and earned income tax credits. This bill passed the Senate by a vote of 51-48.

10. S. 193. Motion to Waive Budgetary Discipline on S. Amdt. 2789 to S. 3457. Passage of this motion was necessary to proceed to final consideration of the Veterans Jobs Corps Act, which would have created a veterans jobs corps and provided a veterans hiring preference in areas such as conservation, firefighting, and law enforcement. This initiative would have helped the nearly one million veterans who are now unemployed. This Senate motion was rejected by a vote of 58-40 (3/5 majority required).

## 11. S. 251. Passage of H.R. 8, as Amended.

The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012, the "fiscal cliff" legislation, averted the scheduled income tax rate increases on all Americans and postponed the spending reductions required by the sequestration process. It made permanent the Bush cuts for individuals making less than \$400,000 and married couples making less

than \$450,000, and extended the improvements to the low-income tax credits for five years. It also continued federal funding for extended unemployment insurance benefits for one year. The Senate passed this bill, as amended, by a vote of 89-8. The House agreed to the Senate amendments by a vote of 257-167 and President Obama signed this legislation into law on January 2, 2013.

## HOUSE VOTE SUMMARIES

1. H. 18. Passage of H.R. 1173. This bill would have repealed the Community Living Assistance Services and Supports Act (CLASS). CLASS provides people with functional limitations with the assistance they need to allow them to maintain their personal and financial independence and continue living in the community. This bill passed the House by a vote of 267-159.

2. H. 72. Agreeing to the Conference Report on H.R. 3630, the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act. This vote extended, for one year, the 2 percent payroll tax cut and up to 99 weeks of unemployment insurance benefits. This legislation passed the Senate by a vote of 60-36, passed the House by a vote of 293-132, and was signed into law by President Obama on February 22, 2012.

3. H. 151. Agreeing to H. Con Res. 112. Popularly known as the Ryan budget, this concurrent resolution set forth the budget of the United States Government for FY 2013 and established budgetary levels for fiscal years 2014 through 2022. The Ryan budget proposed to make devastating cuts to programs that primarily serve low-income Americans, including Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (formerly Food Stamps), Pell Grants, housing, education, training and social services programs. 4. H. 195. Passage of H.R. 4628. This bill sought to repeal Section 4002 of the Affordable Care Act (Obamacare), thereby eliminating funding for the Prevention and Public Health Fund. This fund provides expanded support for the prevention of diabetes, breast cancer, obesity, as well as immunization programs, preventive care and health screenings for infants, children and adolescents. This legislation passed the House by a vote of 215-195 but was rejected by the Senate by a vote of 62-34.

5. H. 207. H. Amdt. 1039 to H.R. 5326. This amendment would have eliminated the economic development assistance programs in the Department of Commerce. These programs provide economic assistance to economically distressed communities to stimulate industrial and community growth and create jobs. This amendment failed in the House by a vote of 279-129.

6. H. 219. H. Amdt. 1060 to H. R. 5326. This amendment would have reduced funding for the Legal Services Corporation by \$328 million. Had this cut in funding been made, tens of thousands of low-income Americans would have been denied assistance with civil legal matters. This amendment failed in the House by a vote of 289-122.

7. H. 220. H. Amdt. 1063 to H. R. 5326. This amendment sought to prohibit the U.S. Attorney General from participating in any legal challenge to immigration enforcement laws in seven states, thus preventing him or her from exercising the exclusive authority of the federal government over immigration laws and enforcement. The Attorney General would no longer be permitted to protect low-income immigrants against violations of their civil rights, including their right to a free education in the public schools and their right not to be discriminated against based on their race or sex. This amendment passed the House by a vote of 238-173.

8. H. 247. Passage of H. R. 5652, the Sequester Replacement Reconciliation Act of 2012. This bill sought to replace the sequester agreed upon as part of the Budget Control Act of 2011 that resolved the debt ceiling crisis. It consisted of a package of harsh cuts to domestic, non-defense programs that serve low-income Americans, including Medicaid, SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, formerly Food Stamps), and employment and training programs. This bill passed the House by a vote of 218-199.

9. H. 249. Passage of H.R. 5326, making appropriations for the Departments of Commerce, Justice, Science and related agencies for FY2013. This appropriations measure would have reduced funding by three percent for several programs important to low-income people, including economic development programs, the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, and the Legal Services Corporation. This legislation passed the House by a vote of 247-163.

## HOUSE VOTE SUMMARIES

10. H.258. Passage of H.R. 4970, reauthorizing the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). This bill differed from the earlier-passed Senate version of VAWA reauthorization by markedly decreasing funding for legal assistance for victims and other previously funded services. It also provided less protection to victims who are gay or undocumented immigrants. This bill passed the House by a vote of 222-205. The Senate and House versions of VAWA reauthorization were never reconciled.

11. H.313. H. Amdt. 1179 to H.R. 5325. This amendment sought to increase funding for the Weatherization Assistance Program and the State Energy Program by over \$180 million. Weatherization is the largest residential efficiency program in the United States. It reduces energy costs for low-income families and the elderly and disabled by lowering their energy demand while creating low-skilled jobs. This amendment failed in the House by a vote of 148-236.

12. H. 362. H. Amdt. 1265 to H.R. 5855. This amendment would have prohibited enforcement of Executive Order 13166, which directs Federal agencies to provide foreign language services to anyone who may seek to engage with the U.S. government. Under this measure, translating or interpreting language services could not be provided to the elderly, disabled and other people with limited English proficiency. This would have a significant adverse effect on many low-income individuals, including U.S. citizens and legal immigrants who are unable to speak English well. This amendment passed the House by a vote of 224-189.

13. H. 430. H. Amdt. 1339 to H.R. 5972. This amendment sought to reduce funding for the Public Housing Operating Fund by \$562 million. This fund provides local housing authorities with the resources needed to maintain health, safety and sanitation for their residents. This amendment failed to pass the House by a vote of 160-264.

14. H.434. H. Amdt. 1342 to H.R. 5972. This amendment sought to eliminate funding for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The CDBG program funds state and local governments to address infrastructure, affordable housing, and economic development needs in low-income communities. This amendment failed to pass the House by a vote of 80-342.

15. H. 460. Passage of H.R. 6079. This bill would repeal, in its entirety, the Affordable Care Act (ACA), popularly known as Obamacare. This vote took place shortly after the U.S. Supreme Court uphold the ACA's constitutionality. Repealing Obamacare would undo numerous provisions that already have been fully implemented, prevent millions of low-income people from obtaining affordable health insurance coverage, deny coverage to people with pre-existing medical conditions, end extended insurance coverage for young adult dependent children, and cause seniors to lose expanded prescription drug coverage. This bill passed the House by a vote of 244-185.

16. H. 589. Passage of H.J. Res. 118. This legislative measure provided for Congressional disapproval of a newly issued federal rule relating to the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) cash assistance program. The federal agency that administers the TANF program had adopted the Rule so that it could use its waiver authority to allow States to test various strategies to improve employment outcomes for welfare recipients. Proponents of the joint resolution mistakenly asserted that the Rule would undermine welfare reform's work requirement by allowing States to ignore current requirements that welfare recipients work in order to receive welfare benefits. This joint resolution passed the House by a vote of 250-164.

17. H. 659. Motion to Concur in Senate Amendments to H.R. 8. The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012, the "fiscal cliff" legislation, averted the scheduled income tax rate increases on all Americans and postponed the spending reductions required by the sequestration process. It made permanent the Bush cuts for individuals making less than \$400,000 and married couples making less than \$450,000, and extended the improvements to the low-income tax credits for five years. It also continued federal funding for extended unemployment insurance benefits for one year. The Senate passed this bill, as amended, by a vote of 89-8. The House agreed to the Senate amendments by a vote of 257-167 and President Obama signed this legislation into law on January 2, 2013.





## **POVERTY RATE BY STATE**


